Country-defined universal access

- 111 countries have defined universal access targets – they are ambitious and reach real people.
- Targets have been set in each country through a participatory process involving people living with HIV, communities, civil society, governments and international organizations.
- The targets have been set based on the increasing potential and capacity to scale up HIV services in countries.
- The country-defined universal access approach means countries prioritize the most effective programmatic interventions according to the type of national epidemic.
- Without an increase in investments available, countries will not be able to achieve their 2010 targets.

Investment needs

- Based on the country-defined targets for 2010, it is estimated that an investment of US\$ 25 billion will be required for the global AIDS response in 2010. (See Fig. 1)
- Of the \$25 billion, one third will go towards strengthening health systems in low- and middle-income countries. Another one third will fund HIV specific health services, and the remaining for other multi-sectoral programmes.
- HIV prevention programmes will require \$11.6 billion, while providing treatment would cost \$6.9 billion.
- Sub-Saharan Africa requires nearly half of the total global resource needs.

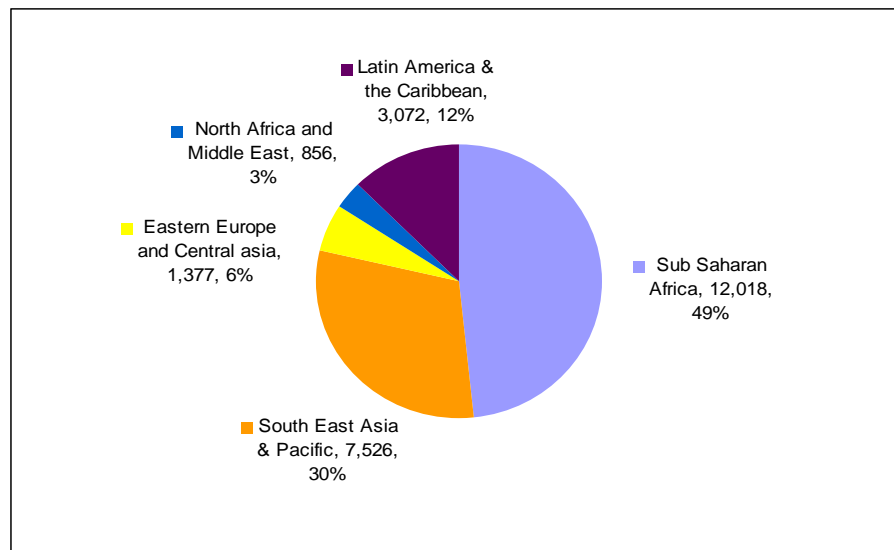
Sources of Funding

- Countries will have to provide one third (\$8.3 billion) of the total resource needs, with the remaining two thirds (\$16.7 billion) from international sources.
- Upper middle-income countries, particularly in Latin America, Eastern Europe and Asia, will have to finance their programmes from domestic sources.

Impact of investments

- With an investment of \$25 billion by 2010:
 - 1.3 million deaths averted (2009-2010).
 - 2.6 million new HIV infections prevented (2009-2010).
 - 6.7 million people on antiretroviral treatment.
 - 74.5 million pregnant women offered comprehensive PMTCT.
 - 6.7 million orphans in sub-Saharan Africa receiving social support services.
 - 7.5 million sex workers reached.
 - 9.6 million people who inject drugs reached with harm reduction programmes.
 - 20.4 million men who have sex with men reached.
 - 1.5 million male circumcisions performed.
 - 8.15 billion condoms provided.
