Framing the thematic segment on youth

1. Youth centred format for open dialogue
2. The four key components of the day
 - **'Walk in my shoes'**: with four young people living with HIV.
 - **Successful HIV prevention** for young people
 - Scaling up **HIV testing** among young people
 - Improving access and adherence to **treatment** for young people living with HIV

Conclusions

- Evidence informed HIV programmes work and must be scaled up to have impact
- Existing programmes must be made more sensitive to the needs of adolescents
- Parental consent laws and policies are a barrier to access including HIV testing and counselling, harm reduction and treatment

Conclusions continued

- Youth participation through the full programme development cycle can lead to more effective programmes
- Very limited data available in relation to adolescents aged 10 – 19, young key populations and young people living with HIV
 - Routine data disaggregated by age and sex
 - Investment in research for adolescents and young key populations
 - Clarify research protocol guidelines for involving under 18s recognizing the evolving capacity of adolescents
