Global HIV statistics¹

- **41.0 million** [35.3 million–47.5 million] people globally were living with HIV in 2025.
 - **1.2 million** [950 000 –1.7 million] people newly acquired HIV in 2025.
 - **570 000** [430 000–780 000] people died from AIDS-related illnesses in 2025.
 - **32.1 million** people [28.2 million–33.4 million] were accessing antiretroviral therapy in 2025.
 - **92.0 million** [70.2 million–123.5 million] people have acquired HIV since the start of the epidemic.
 - **44.2 million** [33.8 million–61.1 million] people have died from AIDS-related illnesses since the start of the epidemic.
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People living with HIV

- In 2025, there were 41.0 million [35.3 million–47.5 million] people living with HIV.
 - 39.7 million [34.1 million–46.0 million] adults (15 years or older).
 - 1.3 million [1.0 million–1.7 million] children (0–14 years).
 - 53% of all people living with HIV were women and girls.
 - 88% [67–>98%] of all people living with HIV knew their HIV status in 2025.
 - About 5.0 million people did not know that they were living with HIV in 2025.
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People living with HIV accessing antiretroviral therapy

- At the end of December 2025, 32.1 million people [28.2 million–33.4 million] people were accessing antiretroviral therapy, up from 7.6 million [6.7–7.9 million] in 2010.
- In 2025, 78% [59–94%] of all people living with HIV were accessing treatment.
 - 79% [60–95%] of adults aged 15 years and older living with HIV had access to treatment, as did 55% [39–78%] of children aged 0–14 years.
 - 84% [63–>98%] of women aged 15 years and older had access to treatment; however, only 74% [56–88%] of men aged 15 years and older had access.
- 87% [73 – >98%] of pregnant women living with HIV had access to antiretroviral medicines to prevent transmission of HIV to their child in 2025.

New HIV infections

- New HIV infections have been reduced by 65% since the peak in 1994.
 - In 2025, 1.2 million [950 000–1.7 million] people newly acquired HIV, compared to 3.5 million [2.7 million–4.7 million] people in 1994.
 - Women and girls accounted for 44% of all new HIV acquisitions in 2025.
- Since 2010, new HIV acquisitions have declined by 42%, from 2.1 million [1.6 million–2.9 million] to 1.2 million [950 000–1.7 million] in 2025.
- Since 2010, new HIV acquisitions among children have declined by 69%, from 300 000 [200 000–450 000] in 2010 to 93 000 [63 000–140 000] in 2025. Although progress in reducing new HIV acquisitions is greatest among children, progress has stalled in recent years.

AIDS-related deaths

- AIDS-related deaths have been reduced by 73% since the peak in 2004 and by 57% since 2010.
- In 2025, around 570 000 [430 000–780 000] people died from AIDS-related illnesses worldwide, compared to 2.1 million [1.6 million–3.0 million] people in 2004 and 1.3 million [1.0 million–1.8 million] people in 2010.
- AIDS-related mortality has declined by 60% among women and girls and by 55% among men and boys since 2010.
- In 2025, someone died of HIV-related causes every minute.

People most affected by HIV

- Risk factors compounded by marginalization, discrimination, and in some cases criminalization, resulted in higher risk of HIV acquisitions among certain groups of people compared to all adults (15-49):
 - 18 times higher among gay men and other men who have sex with men
 - 17 times higher among sex workers
 - 34 times higher among people who inject drugs
 - 17 times higher among transgender women
 - HIV prevalence is 2 times higher among people in prisons and other closed settings.
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Testing and treatment targets (95–95–95)

- In 2025, 88% [67→98%] of all people living with HIV knew their HIV status. Among people who knew their status, 89% [67→98%] were accessing treatment. And among people accessing treatment, 95% [72→98%] were virally suppressed.
 - Among children aged 0–14 years the 95–95–95 targets were 65% [46%–93%], 84% [59%→98%], 85% [60%→98%]
 - Among adult women, the 95–95–95 targets were: 91% [68→98%], 92% [69→98%], and 95% [71→98%].
 - Among men, the 95–95–95 targets were: 86% [65→98%] of adult men living with HIV knew their HIV status, 86% [65→98%] were accessing treatment and 95% [72→98%] were virally suppressed.
 - Among all people living with HIV, 88% [67→98%] knew their status, 78% [59–94%] were accessing treatment and 74% [64–86%] were virally suppressed in 2025.
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Investments

- At the end of 2025, US\$ 17.6 billion was available for the AIDS response in low- and middle-income countries — about 20% below the US\$ 21.9 billion needed annually by 2030 to stay on track to end AIDS as a public health threat.
 - Around 60% was from domestic sources. Domestic funding increased by 4% in 2025. Since 2025, more than 55 countries have reported plans to increase their domestic HIV budgets.
 - Total international resources for HIV response declined by 18%, the largest decline in almost two decades.
