Resilient and sustainable systems for health	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• External funding for the HIV response has made important contributions to supporting health system building blocks.• HIV responses have pioneered programmatic innovations and people-centered approaches (e.g. differentiated service delivery).• UNAIDS has been instrumental in strengthening CSO capacity, engagement in national HIV responses, and beyond.
